COACHES.

CONVEYANCE BY RAILWAY.

The nearest Station is that at AYLESBURY, 10 miles from WINSLOW, in connexion with the LONDON and BIRMINGHAM Line. LEIGHTON BUZZARD Station on the same Line is rather more distant. From these Stations passengers may proceed to almost any part of England.

WYCOMBE, HIGH AND WEST, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

HIGH WYCOMBE, or **CHIPPING WYCOMBE**, is, as its ancient Saxon name implies, a market town—it is likewise a corporate and parliamentary borough, in the parish of its name and hundred of Desborough; 29 miles w. by s. from London, 25 s. e. from Oxford, 10 n. from Maidenhead, Berks (a railway station on the Great Western line), and about 15 south from Tring (Herts), where there is a station on a branch line in connexion with the London and Birmingham railway. The town is pleasantly situated in a valley, on the banks of the Wycombe stream, and is considered the handsomest one in the county. It consists of one long and spacious street, from which branches out several smaller ones. The town-hall, situated in the High-street, is a good substantial structure of brick, supported on stone pillars, built in 1757 at the expense of John Earl of Shelburn: in this hall are held the sessions for the town, and other public meetings. This borough appears to have been first incorporated in 1461, but the

mayor and aldermen are mentioned in a record of the reign of Edward III. The new municipal act, passed in 1835, vested the government of the town in a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, under the style of 'the mayor, bailiffs and burgesses of the borough of Chipping Wycombe, in the county of Buckingham.' The present and ex-mayor are magistrates. High Wycombe has sent members to parliament from the 28th of Edward I; those at present sitting for the borough are, George Henry Dashwood, esq. and Captain Ralph Bernal: the mayor is the returning officer. The trade of the town comprises the manufacture of lace and paper, the latter to a great extent; in making of chairs many find employment—the malting business is very considerable—and the valuable Wycombe stream is available to the working many mills, not only for its paper trade, but for grinding corn in large quantities; its local trade is also good, and it receives much adventitious aid by the daily influx of strangers, Wycombe
