**WINGRAVE, with the Hamlet of ROWSHAM,**  
 Is a village and parish in the Ivinghoe division of the three  
 Hundreds of Cottesloe, and Union of Aylesbury, from  
 which latter place it is distant 5½ miles north-east, plea-  
 santly situate on a hill commanding a fine view of the  
 town of Aylesbury and the surrounding country. The  
 church, which is dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul, is  
 a very fine structure in the early English and perpen-  
 dicular styles of architecture, consisting of a nave, two  
 aisles, and a chancel, with asquare tower at the west end,  
 containing 6 bells and a clock. The living is a vicarage,  
 in the gift of Lord Alford, of the value of £120 a year, in the  
 diocese of Oxford. The incumbent is the Rev. John

Molesworth Butt, M.A. There is a day and Sunday school  
 in connection with the church, supported by voluntary  
 contributions. There are two Dissenting chapels, one for  
 the Independents, the other for Primitive Methodists.  
 The soil is chiefly of a clayey nature, producing excellent  
 crops of wheat and beans. There is a curious custom,  
 which has been followed up from time immemorial, of  
 strewing the church with hay on the first Sunday after St.  
 Peter, about half an acre of grass land having been left for  
 that purpose. There are charitable bequests to the amount  
 of about £30, distributed annually amongst the poor.  
 Population, in 1851, was 663; acreage, 2,600.

**WINSLOW-cum-SHIPTON,** a small market town,  
 in Cottesloe Hundred and Union, 48½ miles north-  
 west from London, 10½ north-west from Aylesbury  
 and the station of the London and North Western railway,  
 6½ south-east of Buckingham, and 12 miles north-west  
 from Leighton Buzzard and the station of the London and  
 North Western railway, contains 1,888 inhabitants; its  
 area is 1,900 acres, which belong to W. S. Lowndes, Esq.,  
 lord of the manor, and a few smaller owners. The church,  
 dedicated to St. Lawrence, is a venerable structure, with  
 square embattled tower, containing 6 bells and a clock.  
 The living is a vicarage, valued at £220, in the gift of the  
 Crown, and incumbency of the Rev. W. W. McCreight,  
 A.B. By the Poor Law Commissioners, Winslow has been  
 constituted the centre of a Union, comprising 17 parishes.  
 The market is held on the Thursday, for corn, pigs, &c.;  
 and annual fairs are held February 18th, March 20th, April  
 20th, Holy Thursday, August 21st, Sept. 22nd, November  
 26th, and 2nd Thursday in December, for cattle, &c.; and  
 the 1st Thursday before the 11th October, also on the 1st  
 and 2nd Thursday afterwards, for hiring servants. The  
 town stands on the brow of a hill, overlooking a fertile vale,  
 and is of very remote antiquity, said to have been given by

King Offa to St. Alban's Abbey. The houses are chiefly  
 of brick, and neatly arranged in three principal streets, and  
 a square market place in the centre. The Manor House, a  
 stately mansion, late the seat of W. S. Lowndes, Esq.,  
 now occupied as a school by Dr. Lovell, was built by  
 Sir Christopher Wren. Middle Claydon House, the seat  
 of Sir Harry Verney, Bart., stands in the valley, about 3  
 miles west of the town. Swanbourn House, the seat of Sir  
 Thos. Fremantle, Bart., is about 2 miles south. E. W. S.  
 Lowndes, and P. Dauncey, Esqs., have each neat mansions  
 near the town. The inhabitants are chiefly agriculturists  
 and lace makers. Opium has been cultivated here by John  
 Cowley, Esq. The town has been lighted with gas since 1843.  
 A private reading room has been established in the town,  
 supported by subscription. Petty sessions are held every  
 alternate Thursday at the Bell inn; David Thos. Willis,  
 Esq., clerk to the magistrates. The Independents and  
 the Baptists have each a chapel here; and there is a  
 National school, incorporated with a Free school, for the  
 education of boys. The Oxford and Bletchley railway  
 passes through the parish, and a very handsome station  
 has been erected on it.

**GREAT and LITTLE WOLSTON.**

**GREAT WOLSTON** is a parish and village, 3 miles from Newport Pagnell, and 47 from London, in the Hundreds of Newport Pagnell. The living is a rectory, in the diocese of Oxford, value £157, in the gift of the Queen, having become possessed of it through the extraordinary bequest of J. Camden Nield, Esq., who so recently left the whole of his property (amounting, it was computed, to about £500,000) to her Majesty. The church is a small edifice, and is dedicated to the Holy Trinity; the Rev. Edward Hill, M.A., is the incumbent. The parish contains 550 acres. The lordship of the manor is vested in trustees,

**WOLVERTON**, a parish in the Hundred of Newport, 1 mile east-north-east from Stoney Stratford, contained, in 1851, 2,070 inhabitants and about 2,081 acres of land. The trustees of the late Dr. Radcliffe are lords of the manor. The living is a discharged vicarage, in the archdeaconry of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford, rated in the King's Books at £10 3s. 9d., endowed with £400 private benefaction, and £400 royal bounty; present value about £35; it is in the patronage of the Radcliffe trustees. **LITTLE WOLSTON** is a parish and village, distant from Newport 3 miles, and from London 48 miles, in the Hundreds of Newport Pagnell. The living is a rectory, in the diocese of Oxford, value £140, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor. The Rev. Francis Rose, D.D., is the incumbent. There is a small portion of land, the rent of which is appropriated to the apprenticing of one poor boy yearly. The population, in 1851, was 72. The parish contains 620 acres and 20 poles. Henry Snaith Trower, Esq., is lord of the manor.

The London and North Western Railway has a station in this parish, 1 mile from the old church, 2 miles from Stoney Stratford, 52 $\frac{1}{2}$  miles on the line from London, and 60 miles from Birmingham; here is the central locomotive depôt on the line from London to Birmingham, where the company have erected extensive factories for the repairs, &c., of the locomotive engines, which afford employment to a great number
